## School Transportation Statistics

There are many ways of getting home from Highland Park school. One way is by playing with the YMCA until your parents pick you up. Out of the 402 kids in this school, 24 go to the YMCA after school Another way to get home is to ride in a car with your parent / guardian. 104 kids in this school are car riders Many kids in the school ride the bus. Of those kids, 46 ride bus \#2, 33 kids ride bus \#80, 36 kids ride bus \#12, 19 kids ride bus \#17, 32 kids ride bus \#74, and 15 kids ride bus \#118. That leaves a total of 199 kids riding the buses. There are also 70 walkers. Transportation has been a problem for RCPS because there is a shortage of bus drivers and 25 school bus routes have been late. When the buses are late, some teachers stay until the buses get there to pick up kids. The late buses have led many kids to switch to being car riders and walkers so they can get to and from school on time. We interviewed a few people to see what their experiences have been. One person we interviewed was Remington Goldberg. He goes home on the bus when he doesn't have after school clubs. He said it was a bit weird but overall, a fine experience. He says his bus has been late before though. Another person we interviewed was a walker that goes to the YMCA group. She said it was good and that she goes home with her older brother. We interviewed a car rider that said it was fine. Overall, the school transportation system is fine even though there are some kinks to work out that effect some wavs of travel more than others.
